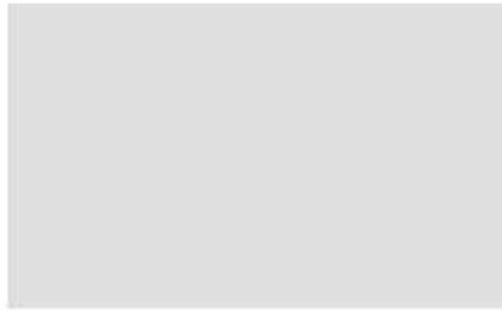

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Product Overview

The Street Index Guide (SIG) is a database that defines the streets within a given wire center and county boundaries. It includes an alphabetical list of the street names, street types, directional information, low-high values for house number ranges, community names, wire center and the county associated with the address within the Sprint service areas.

Upon request, Sprint will provide a CD-ROM containing street address information for areas served by the Sprint local operating companies within the state. States with multiple operating companies include Florida, Kansas, North Carolina, Texas and Virginia. The information is in the National Emergency Number Association Two (NENA2) format.

The SIG data extract will be sent to the requesting Competitive Local Exchange Carrier (CLEC) within 30 days of the initial request. The CLEC will receive one CD-ROM per state on a monthly basis until the request is cancelled.

Product Benefits

This offering allows the CLEC the ability to validate address information for their end users or to maintain the street index information internally.

Ordering Process

The CLEC will access the Street Index form on the Sprint Local Wholesale website at www.sprint.com/localwholesale. The form is located under CLEC/Forms. The CLEC must complete the form and e-mail or fax it to the appropriate E911 Database Administrator. One form will need to be completed for each state requested.

The CD-ROM will be sent by United States Postal Service mail. Invoicing for the CD-ROM will occur on a monthly basis until a cancellation request is submitted.

To cancel the request, the CLEC must complete the Street Index Guide Data Extract Request Form and indicate that the type of request is "Cancel". The CLEC will complete the form and e-mail or fax it to the appropriate E911 Database Administrator who will forward it to the NEAC for cancellation.

Note: The request must include the Billing Account Number (BAN) that is being charged for the extract. This will assist in the cancellation of invoicing. To request a contact change and/or address information change, a request form should be completed indicating that the type of request is "Contact/Address Change" and e-mail or fax the form to the appropriate E911 Database Administrator.

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Requirements

Prior to placing a SIG Database Extract request, the CLEC must have a signed Master Resale Agreement or a signed Master Interconnection and Resale Agreement with Sprint.

Invoicing Elements

Monthly recurring charges (MRC) and nonrecurring charges (NRC) are applicable for this product. Rates are applied based on each state-specific agreement and may be found in the price sheet within the agreement. Table 1 reflects the Universal Service Order Codes (USOC) associated with this service.

Frequently Asked Questions

	Question	Answer
1.	How would a one-time request be handled?	The CLEC should submit a request form. When the first CD-ROM is received, the CLEC should immediately submit a cancellation request form.
2.	Does the extract contain all streets within a county?	All streets within a county served by Sprint will be provided in the extract.
3.	In what states does Sprint have multiple operating companies?	Sprint has multiple operating companies in Florida, Kansas, North Carolina, Texas and Virginia. Extract Reports for these states will include information from all operating companies.
